
#### University of Nebraska Kearney Athletics COVID-19 Summer Camp Policy and Procedure

The Athletic Department's policy and procedure is outlined below for the safe participation in summer camps. This plan is subject to change as the COVID-19 situation evolves and new information becomes available from the state, local health department and CDC.

#### Summer Camps:

- All campers will be emailed the summer camp policy and procedure sheet along with educational information regarding signs and symptoms of Covid-19. Anyone showing signs and symptoms, or who has been in contact with someone who has, should stay home and not attend camp.
- Each camper/coach will go through a screening of questions along with a temperature check upon arrival at check in on day 1 of camp and potentially each day of camp.
  - Screening will consist of a series of questions, along with daily temperatures and symptom check list
- A temperature check will then be required daily before being allowed to begin camp
  - If temperature if 100.4 or above camper will not be allowed to attend camp.
  - If temperature is 99 degrees or above it is up to the discretion of the athletic trainer to determine if the camper can safely attend camp.
  - If a camper is determined not safe to attend camp a refund policy will be at the discretion of the camp director depending on the days of camp missed.
- Campers must enter the HSC through the west doors or other instructed entry to ensure proper screening.
- If high school gyms are utilized campers will need to report to the HSC (west side of building) to get a screen before going to the high school.
- Six-foot social distancing will be in place when teams are not playing during team camp and during all activities for individual camps.
- Campers should use the upper level seats in the HSC as a place for teams/campers to gather while maintaining 6ft social distancing from others.
  - Teams may sit together but should keep 6ft distancing between other teams.
  - During team camp while not playing teams are encouraged not to be in the HSC.
- Campers should stay out of the hallways downstairs by the gym doors while not playing, this will not be an area to congregate, <u>campers must sit in upper level bleachers!</u>
- Each camper must bring their own water bottle and sweat towel (if needed) neither will be provided, and neither should be shared between campers.
- Lunch/Dinner is provided for individual camp only, campers will eat in designated areas while maintaining 6-foot distancing.
- Coaches will wipe down volleyballs between matches/sessions.
- Handwashing and sanitizing as much as possible is encouraged.
- Teams will not switch benches between sets, they will not shake hands or high five after matches.
- Parents will not be allowed to stay and watch camp this summer.

We would like to acknowledge that coronavirus (COVID-19) infections have been confirmed throughout the United States, including several cases in Nebraska. We want to make sure you fully understand and appreciate both the known and potential dangers of participating in summer camp and acknowledge that your participation in summer camp may, despite UNK's responsible efforts to mitigate such dangers, result in exposure to COVID-19, which could result in quarantine requirements, serious illness, disability and/or death.



the spread of COVID-19. one of the most trusted and reliable ways to help prevent the spread of airborne infectious diseases is to follow standard precautions.

These precautions were found to be very effective during the SARS outbreak and are recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention as effective precautionary measures to miligate the spread of COVID-19 Like SARS influenza and even the common cold COVID-19 may spread from person to person by respiratory droplets - not simply from a cough, but also through hand touching of the nose and mouth.

Given this knowledge, the NCAA embraces standard precautions for studentathletes and athletics stakehoiders.

The CDC does NOT recommend that people who are well wear a face mask to protect themselves from respiratory diseases including COVID-19



Standard precautions include the following:

Avoid close contact with people who are sick.





touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.



Stay home when

you are sick.



Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, and then throw the tissue in the trash.

Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces using a regular household cleaning spray or wipe.





Be mindful of cafeteria etiquette: Do not refill drinks from a cup you have been drinking from. Avoid touching utensils that others may be using.



Wash your hands often with soap and

water for at least 20 seconds, especially:

- After going to the bathroom. Before and after eating.
- After blowing your nose, coughing or sneezing. If your hands are visibly dirty.
- . If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer.

#### Towels and water bottles:

- · Do not share towels, and be certain to handle your towels yourself.
- Used towels should be placed into a designated area by the athlete.
- Do not share water bottles.
- This includes the practice of an athletics staff squirting water from a water bottle into an athlete's mouth.



# What you need to know about coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19)

#### What is coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19)?

Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) is a respiratory illness that can spread from person to person. The virus that causes COVID-19 is a novel coronavirus that was first identified during an investigation into an outbreak in Wuhan, China.

### Can people in the U.S. get COVID-19?

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Yes. COVID-19 is spreading from person to person in parts of the United States. Risk of infection with COVID-19 is higher for people who are close contacts of someone known to have COVID-19, for example healthcare workers, or household members. Other people at higher risk for infection are those who live in or have recently been in an area with ongoing spread of COVID-19. #### Have there been cases of COVID-19 in the U.S.?

Yes. The first case of COVID-19 in the United States was reported on January 21, 2020. The current count of cases of COVID-19 in the United States is available on CDC's webpage at https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/cases-in-us.html.

#### How does COVID-19 spread?

The virus that causes COVID-19 probably emerged from an animal source, but is now spreading from person to person. The virus is thought to spread mainly between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet) through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes. It also may be possible that a person can get COVID-19 by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose, or possibly their eyes, but this is not thought to be the main way the virus spreads. #### What are the symptoms of COVID-19?

Patients with COVID-19 have had mild to severe respiratory illness with symptoms of

- fever
- cough
- shortness of breath

#### What are severe complications from this virus?

Some patients have pneumonia in both lungs, multi-organ failure and in some cases death.

#### How can I help protect myself?

People can help protect themselves from respiratory illness with everyday preventive actions.

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available.

## If you are sick, to keep from spreading respiratory illness to others, you should

- · Stay home when you are sick.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.

## What should I do if I recently traveled from an area with ongoing spread of COVID-19?

If you have traveled from an affected area, there may be restrictions on your movements for up to 2 weeks. If you develop symptoms during that period (fever, cough, trouble breathing), seek medical advice. Call the office of your health care provider before you go, and tell them about your travel and your symptoms. They will give you instructions on how to get care without exposing other people to your illness. While sick, avoid contact with people, don't go out and delay any travel to reduce the possibility of spreading illness to others.

#### Is there a vaccine?

There is currently no vaccine to protect against COVID-19. The best way to prevent infection is to take everyday preventive actions, like avoiding close contact with people who are sick and washing your hands often.

#### Is there a treatment?

There is no specific antiviral treatment for COVID-19. People with COVID-19 can seek medical care to help relieve symptoms.
